







Our department also continued the tradition of innovation that allows us to improve as an organization. These changes included:


- ◆ *Creation of a Training and Technology Division* – facilitating the integration of new technological tools for officers with the training necessary to make our officers the best and most efficient possible.
- ◆ *Expansion of the Investigative Division and Identification Unit* – Six Investigators positions were re-assigned to Second Shift hours to improve investigative operations, and two Criminalist positions were created in anticipation of the new Automated Fingerprint Identification System terminal coming to our department..
- ◆ *Creation of Neighborhood Beat Officers* – Five officers, four to residential areas, and one to business districts, were assigned to walking beats as part of our Community Oriented Policing philosophy.
- ◆ *Creation of a five-year Strategic Plan* – a guide to lead us where we want to go in the future.

2002 proved that by working together, we can accomplish many things. I look forward to strengthening the partnerships we have made, and creating new ones.







Weed and Seed Calls for Service Totals



COP Office Locations in the City of Racine


