As the Chief of the Racine Police Department, I am pleased to present the 2010 Annual Report. In 2010, the department continued to work in a joint effort with other city agencies to make Racine a great place to live, work and play. This partnership is embraced by our members on a daily basis. As stakeholders in the community we serve, the Racine Police Department continued to combat crime with innovative and consistent enforcement methodology.

Several collaborative, long-term investigations targeted violent criminals operating within our community. The Special Investigations Unit, partnered with the FBI Greater Racine Gang Task Force and the DEA, participated in several major investigations. These partnerships resulted in a significant reduction in violent crime and removed a number of serious criminals from the streets of Racine.

I am excited to report that the crime rate in the city of Racine in 2010 was lower than 2009; but even more dramatically, the crime rate for 2010 was lower than that of 1970. Violent crimes are down 28%, and property crimes are down 37% when compared with 1970. This is a 40-year low in the crime rate for the City of Racine. The continued trend in a lower crime rate is not fully explained, but the cooperation between the Racine Police Department and the citizens of Racine is integral to the success in fighting crime. Our initiatives in Community Oriented Policing, the ongoing dismantling of criminal gangs, cooperation with Neighborhood Watch and activity of community groups have all impacted the crime rate. The willingness of citizens to be good neighbors, report suspicious activity and crimes in progress fuels our success.

During 2010, the Investigative Division again devoted time to investigating unsolved homicides. Three of these “cold-case” homicides were cleared in 2010 by the arrest of four individuals. We continue to make significant progress towards closure in additional cold-case homicides. The victim families in these cases have expressed their gratitude for the extra effort and compassion shown by the detectives working their case.

The Racine Police Department, in its role as a first responder, has recognized the need to understand and train in mental health issues that our officers may encounter. In 2010, our Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training effort continued. NAMI’s CIT training, a community collaboration between mental health professionals, law enforcement, legal systems, family, and consumer advocates, provides the foundation necessary to promote

community and statewide solutions to assist individuals with a mental illness. The CIT Model reduces both the stigma and the need for further involvement with the criminal justice system. CIT provides a forum for effective problem solving regarding the interaction between the criminal justice and mental health care systems and creates the context for sustainable change. In partnership with the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) of Racine County, we presented two training classes to Racine County Law Enforcement Agencies.

In a joint venture between the Racine Police Department and Racine Community Outpost, the Racine Police Department's COP program added a new neighborhood policing office on the 16th Street Corridor. The office was named the "Richard V. Polzin Community Policing Office" in recognition of former Racine Police Chief Polzin. This new initiative also helped develop many new community partnerships in that neighborhood, including those with SC Johnson, Modine Manufacturing Co., Twin Disc, and Home Depot. This office is the cornerstone of the City of Racine's revitalization efforts on the 16th Street Corridor and the Uptown business district. This facility compliments the COP program's existing houses on 6th Street, Mead Street, Geneva Street, Villa Street and Jacato Drive.

In March, 2010, we continued the implementation of Phoenix Records Management System (RMS), launching the Report Writing module, as well as the introduction of Badger TraCS, an automated reporting that improves the accuracy, timeliness and ease with which incident data is collected, shared, and made available for analysis.

In closing, I would like to thank everyone in the community who invested in the sustainability of Racine, by promoting the department's vision of providing an environment in Racine that is free from the fear of crime, where people enjoy a high quality of life, and the community can prosper. We are especially grateful to our community partners who give credibility to Sir Robert Peel's key principle of Community Oriented Policing: "The police are the public and the public are the police."




